ABOUT THE FARM

Fazenda Rodomunho is located near the famous Parnaíba River in Minas Gerais. Its origins date back to family immigration: Thiago Corsi's mother came from Portugal to Rio de Janeiro, while his father immigrated from Italy to the south of Minas Gerais. After meeting in Paraná, the family settled in the Cerrado Mineiro region in 1985, marking the beginning of the farm's history. Producer Thiago Corsi relies on the collaboration of his brothers, Renato and Rodrigo, and his mother Elzi, who is responsible for finances, as well as cousins and brothers-in-law. This close and humanized relationship between Thiago and his employees is directly reflected in the excellence of the production.

CERRADO MINEIRO REGION

Located northwest of Minas Gerais, has a well-defined climate, with hot, rainy summers and dry, mild winters, favoring uniform development of coffee cherries, resulting in a high-quality cup. Producers in this region do big business. The farms are like an industry, so the lots have many bags with the same profile.

With an innovative and sustainable approach, Cerrado Mineiro stands out for having the country's largest certified area of regenerative coffee farming, with almost 30 thousand hectares adopting practices that preserve the environment.

Coffee farming in the region spreads across 55 municipalities, covering approximately 234 thousand hectares and generating an average production of 6 million 60 kg bags per year. With a consolidated reputation, approximately 70% of the coffee from the Cerrado Mineiro is exported, serving demanding markets in Europe, the United States, and Asia.

Due to the primarily flat plateau, it's mainly used mechanically harvesters' machinery in this region. It's fair to say that it's easier to grow coffee in Cerrado. On the other hand, having an irrigation system is necessary, as the region has suffered from droughts in recent years, compromising productivity.

Soil: latosol red.
